Treasurers' Report 2023

The 2022/2023 financial year has seen a return to strong participation in programs and engagement with members at the Caulfield South Community House (CSCH) after two years being significantly impacted by COVID. This has resulted in the continuation of our strong financial position with increases in course and program income, more members and the completion of the major capital works at Kooyong Rd. Our partnership with St. John's Uniting Church has continued to be strengthened as we are united in our commitment to being inclusive and responsive to the needs of the whole community.

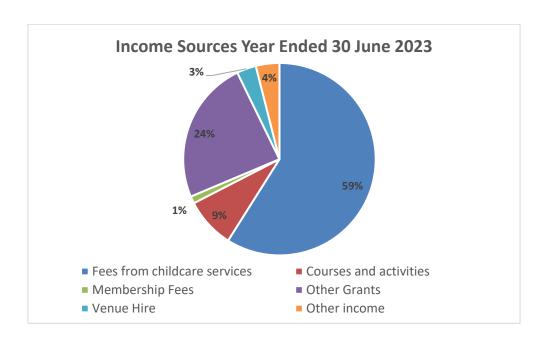
The Independent Reviewers Report of the CSCH finances as at June 30, 2023 has been completed by Frederik R. L. Eksteen of Collins & Co Audit Pty Ltd. His conclusions were that the financial report gives "a true and fair view of the Association's financial position as at 30 June 2023 and of its performance for the year ended on that date and also complying with Australian Accounting Standards".

The CSCH staff and volunteers have done some amazing work throughout the year, rebuilding, reconnecting and maintaining The House as a vibrant place of friendship and learning. The programs and services offered by the CSCH provide people of all ages with opportunities to grow and learn, they connect families and children and they help build community. The key activities of the House are providing affordable, quality childcare, adult classes such as EAL, Computer, Welsh, Health and Fitness activities, the Community Garden, holiday programs and a range of social activities.

The demand for childcare and children services remained high through the year and we are fortunate to have such committed staff working every day to ensure that being at the House is a positive experience for all children and families. There is increased pressure on childcare and children services and CSCH has worked hard to ensure that the service remains affordable and is of a high quality.

The completion of the major capital works at the Kooyong Rd site has been a significant achievement and the staff have done an outstanding job guiding this work and maintaining services throughout the building program. The facilities are now excellent and have enabled programs to be expanded and developed. This year upgrades of IT systems in program areas were also completed. Members and participants greatly appreciate the improvements in the facilities at the House.

The CSCH results for the financial year ending 30 June 2023 reflect an operating deficit of \$14,170 (FY22 - \$28,552 surplus). Income increased from \$679,989 in 2022 to \$710,064 in 2023 however operating costs have increased and the costs associated with re-establishing the range of programs was significant. Income from courses and activities increased, as did income from grants and child care services.



\$171,353 was received from grants during the year which included Department of Health and Human Services (\$92,000), City of Glen Eira (\$25,000), City of Glen Eira (\$25,000 rental assistance), Department of Jobs, Precincts and Regions (\$20,000), City of Glen Eira (\$5,000) and Zoe Daniels MP Volunteer Support Program (\$2,200). This year there were no COVID related grants received.

Expenditure increased from \$651,437 in FY22 to \$724,234 in FY23. The highest increases in costs were to staffing relating costs, course expenses, rent and site improvements. Over the past two years the Committee of Management worked to ensure that staff entitlements are fully met and that the work environment is one in which people wish to contribute and grow. The redevelopment of the Chapel has been completed and we continue to work in partnership with the St John's Uniting Church.

The total assets of CSCH are \$431,527 and total liabilities of \$69,243. The resulting Net Assets are \$362,284 (FY22 \$376,454).

The CSCH is very fortunate to have team of committed and capable staff, who are led by an outstanding Manager. The Committee of Management appreciates all the work they do and their contributions to the maintenance of the good financial practices and the sound financial position of the organisation. The CSCH continues to do great work in the community helping people to grow, learn and connect. The Committee of Management wishes to thank staff and volunteers for all their efforts throughout the year.

Managers' Report 2023

This is my favourite time of the year - Writing reports, financial audits, regulated processes and constitution policies – Definitely NOT!

But, what is my favourite, is inviting our community House friends, members and special guests to our AGM meeting presenting on how our past year has transpired.

It gives me great pleasure to present my managers' report to our community, its members and the wider group – I am sure you will all enjoy the story.

We have (hand on heart) really had a wonderful year and my favourite time of year provides both myself and the Committee of Management the opportunity to reflect on how exceptionally proud we are of our growing Community, our team of Volunteers and importantly our administration staff and educators.

This favourite time of year provides Rebecca the enormous task of sorting an entire year of photos and picking only a few that can fit into a 3 minute music clip. A reflection of photos from all our programs, activities, fundraising functions, events, social gatherings, garden celebrations and of course – the numerous photos of our child care children – the colour, the smiles, the joy on their faces is priceless.

In the 2022/23 operational period and across all facets of the Community House, we have had many "fist pump" moments. These moments can be a really big deal or they can be quite small in comparison but have made a significant impact.

What CSCH do really well is celebrate moments – we celebrate really really well and quite often!

I would like to share a few 'fist pump moments' with you, and in no particular order they are:

- CSCH are currently employing equivalent to 17 FTE employees highest number of employees since inception
- CSCH volunteer team comprise of 48 active volunteers leading program, leading teams and sharing skills is something they all have mastered
- We have hit an all time high of welcoming more than 470 participating members through our Community House front doors
- Fundraised more than \$7,000 for various charity organisations across the year
- Increased our-In-House charity including rental assistance, food/petrol vouchers and providing emergency home gardening services
- Built and upgraded a grand total of 28 community garden harvest beds
- Introduced the Resilience Early Years Program into our preschool sessions
- Our volunteer barista pours an average of 32 cappuccinos/lattes every Tuesday at our chitter chatter café program
- Our members have donated more than 50 boxes /bags of non-perishable pantry items and delivered to Glen Eira CIS and St.Kilda Mission for distribution and emergency care
- Upgraded our IT facilities in all programming areas
- Our "Mens Only Class" have increased from 3 participants to average of 10 men, who stay for a coffee after the class every week and chat!
- Childcare celebration of cultural diversity included visiting Japan, France, Greece, Africa, India, Italy and recognising Jewish traditions, indigenous culture and more!
- Our Community Garden Open Days are held monthly and on most occasions, we were able to secure sort after, local environmental and sustainability leading experts to present on pressing issues such as sustainability and organic processes in our gardens, biodiversity, garden bees, healthy soil, edible gardens, fruit trees and more!

CSCH Child Care service is continually receiving positive recognition within the community. Families are willing and waiting for vacancies to bring their children to our exceptional early learning sessions. Our commitment to deliver a quality service and keep our fees affordable for accessibility for all families, is certainly something we are all very proud and worthy of a fist pump.

CSCH Community Garden is an award winning sanctuary in Glen Eira where we are kicking sustainable goals, following organic gardening processes and providing spaces for experimental gardening projects. Engaging Deb Punton to deliver gardening learning programs to educate our community groups to become aware of sustainable gardening, gardening for wellness and basic garden techniques to grow your own food. Our garden and our education programs are one of a kind in the Glen Eira region and is definitely a fist pump moment.

One of our strategic priorities for the 2022/23 year was to focus on community partnerships, community service networking and connection. This focus of combined forces, shared services and funding acquisitions has enabled the House to continue its exceptional program delivery to meet the needs and expectations of our participants. Importantly, it provides access to additional resources to reach further, spread wider and delve deeper to find those people, for various reasons - needed us the most. Special mentions to:

Note 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

This financial report includes the financial statements and notes of the Caulfield South Community House, an incorporated association, which is incorporated in Victoria under the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act* 2012.

Basis of preparation

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not for Profits Commission Act* 2012 and the *Associations Incorporation Reform Act* 2012 The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report has been prepared on an accruals accounting basis and is based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the company in the preparation of the general purpose financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Accounting Policies

a. Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at-call with banks, other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

b. Income Tax

The Association is exempt from paying income tax by virtue of Section 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act* 1997.

c. Property, Plant and Equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost where applicable, less any accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment was depreciated on a straight-line basis over their useful lives to the company commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

d. Employee Entitlements

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee benefits have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Provision is made for the Association's liability for long service leave from commencement of employment, not from the 5 year employment period normally accrued as industry practice.

Note 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

e. Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the Association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

f. Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity reviews the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is an indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

g. Revenue

Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

Revenue is brought to account when received and to the extent that it relates to the subsequent period it is disclosed as a liability.

Grant Income

Grant income received, other than for specific purposes, is brought to account over the period to which the grant relates.

Deferred Income

Unspent grant income received in relation to specific projects and events is not brought to account as revenue in the current year but deferred as a liability in the financial statements until spent for the purpose received.

Capital Grants

Grant Income received relating to the purchase of capital items is shown as Unamortised Capital Grant and brought to account over the expected life of the asset in proportion to the related depreciation charge.

Interest Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest rate method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument.

Donations

Donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds which is generally at the time of receipt.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

h. Comparative Figures

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

Note 1. Statement of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

i. Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

j Related Party Transactions

The Committee Members act in an honorary capacity and are not paid for their services as Committee Members.

There were no transactions with related parties during the 2023 year.
